Erin's Law

Erin's Law, mandates all public schools provide sexual abuse prevention education for grades K-6 and sexual violence prevention education for grades 7-12. Project Woman offers prevention education to local schools to fulfill the requirements of Erin's Law. The prevention team utilizes the All Ready curriculum developed by the Community Health Foundation and Project Woman, and the Safe Dates curriculum, an evidence-based program published by Hazelden Publishing. Topics in each curriculum include: effective communication, healthy relationships, dating abuse recognition and prevention, and sexual violence prevention.

ACCREDITED

Project Woman achieved full national accreditation with a perfect score from the New York-based Council on Accreditation (COA) through December 31, 2025. COA is the independent, not-for-profit accreditor of community-based behavioral health care and social service organizations for the United States and Canada. All staff participated in a detailed review and analysis of Project Woman's administration, management, programs, and service delivery against standards of best practices.

The accreditation standards ensure that services are well-coordinated, culturally competent, evidence-based, outcomes-oriented, and provided by a skilled and supported workforce. "COA accreditation lets our stakeholders and the community know that we have demonstrated accountability in the management of our resources and have met the standards for best practices in our programs, services, and administration," said Laura Baxter, Project Woman executive director.
